Questions for Further Study

	Quodition of Further Study
1.	What does it mean to be "set apart" by God? Read Judges 13 and Ephesians 1:4. How does Samson's calling from birth compare to the calling believers have in Christ? In what ways do we live out or neglect that calling?
2.	How do we confuse gifting with godliness? Consider Judges 14–16 alongside passages like 1 Samuel 16:7 and Matthew 7:21–23. Where in your life have you relied more on talent or appearances than true spiritual surrender?
3.	What led to Samson's spiritual downfall—and how can we avoid similar patterns? Track the recurring themes in Samson's choices (e.g., lust, pride, impulsiveness). How do these patterns still appear today, and what spiritual disciplines help guard against them?
4.	What is the significance of Judges 16:20—"He did not know that the Lord had left him"? What does this verse reveal about spiritual awareness and intimacy with God? How do we cultivate a life where we remain sensitive to the Spirit's presence?
5.	How does Samson foreshadow Jesus—and how is Jesus different? Compare Samson's final act in Judges 16:30 with Jesus' sacrifice or the cross (Philippians 2:5–11, Hebrews 9:14). What does this contrast teach us about power, humility, and redemption?
