Why is it eternally important to speak up?

- 1. Because someone else's hope might depend on it.
- 2. Because your words might be the only gospel they hear.
- 3. Because speaking strengthens your own faith.

Psalm 71:16

Your confidence to speak was never meant to rest in your strength, but in God's power.

Exodus 4:10-12

Practical steps to depend on God's strength when speaking to others.

- 1. Pray before you speak.
- 2. Anchor your words in Scripture.
- 3. Let your weakness point to His strength.
- 4. Ask others to help.

It's not about <u>what</u> I can do. It's about <u>what</u> God can do through me.

## Weekly Application Step:

Practice the "sentence testimony." Write one sentence that starts with: "This week I saw God..." or "God has been teaching me..." Pray that God allows you to share it and be ready to share it in casual conversation.

2.	Psalm 71:15 says, "My mouth will tell of your righteous deeds" What would it look like for your daily conversations to be more anchored in God's truth than in your frustrations?
3.	The Psalmist says, "though I know not how to relate them all." How does this verse encourage you when you feel you "don't know enough" to speak up for God?
4.	Read Acts 1:8. How does the role of a "witness" in Scripture change your perspective on sharing your faith?
5.	Read Psalm 71:16 and Exodus 4:10–12. What do these passages teach about where our speaking confidence should come from?
